Maths Olympiad

Maths Olympiad is a competition for students from all over Australia and New Zealand, and also a personal learning opportunity for those involved.

The main aim is to get experience using different mathematical problem solving skills and have fun doing it!

This year, Mount Barker Primary School had 20 students enter the competition, 7 in the senior section and 13 in the junior section. Bailey, Ned, Ethan, Julienne, Coby, Harrison, Shashini, George and Seb all had commendable results.

Both Bailey, senior, and Ned, junior, had the highest score from our school within their sections. Ned also placed within the top 10% of all students that entered while Harrison was within the top 40% and Shashini and George placing in the top 50%.

A special mention was given to both Seb, senior, and George, junior, for making the most improvement since the previous Maths Olympiad.

BUSHFIRE SEASON - A GUIDE FOR PARENTS

Parents are encouraged to access a brochure which provides important information about what our schools/preschools will do on a catastrophic fire day or in the event of a fire.

Bushfires can occur at any time during summer. It's important that our families understand our Site Emergency Plan and are prepared and have a plan in place for their family when these situations arise.

If there is a bushfire emergency while children are onsite we will keep them safe until the danger has cleared even if this is outside of normal school hours.

Parents are asked to ensure that the school has current information about their child including home address, emergency contacts and medical conditions. In the event of an emergency it may not be possible to contact the school and the school can only release students to people on their emergency contact list.

All students are reminded to bring their drink bottle daily (water only).
